Escapee dogs could avoid pound

The service would only apply to registered dogs that have a clean record with no escapes recorded in

the previous 18 months.

Kingston Council has asked officers to investigate the initiative along with a raft of changes to fines and fees.

Councillors voted to investigate dumping fines for first time offenders as long as the dog was registered and could be returned home rather than taken to the Lost Dogs Home in Cranbourne West.

They also supported reducing registration fees for dogs over 12 years old, providing more "robust" dog tags and investigating alternative temporary pound facilities in Kingston such as vet clinics or doggie day care centres.

Cr Georgina Oxley proposed the changes after public feedback.

"For a lot of people pets are part of the family and when they do go missing it's devastating both for the humans and the pets," Cr Oxley

"I think it's important that when a dog goes missing we return them home as soon as possible."

Cr David Eden said he had spoken to pensioners who had to pay up to \$700 in council fines and fees from the dog pound.

"That's a big hit for a lot of people," he said.

"I think we need to look at more flexible arrangements. The police wouldn't arrest your kid if they were wandering on the street and put them in a jail cell and then ask you for \$700 to get them back."

The proposed changes struck a chord in the chamber with councillors unanimously backing the plan.

Cr Rosemary West said she had compared notes with Cr Oxley on their "Houdini hounds".

"My dog climbed a tree to climb over the guinea pig hutch and jump down off the letter box several times and I've been giving boxes of chocolates to people who would very kindly collect her and ring me," Cr West said.

The 12-month program aims to encourage the older generation to share their wisdom with children about avoiding injuries.

Freedom Aged Care residents will buddy-up with youngsters from North Cheltenham Preschool to complete a series of activities focusing on socialisation, physical movement and safety awareness. "We're not an

organisation that's about bubble-wrapping and helicopter parenting, we're very much about let's get the kids out there doing activities, having experiences, so they can really make judgments themselves," KIDS Foundation founder and director Dr Susie O'Neill said.

The program aims to teach the children about more than just safety. "We thought why don't we teach them how to have great relationships with — and respect — the elderly, their parents and other friends?" Dr O'Neill said.

KIDS is planning to roll out extra programs to aged care centres across Melbourne this year.
